## **Obituary to Stephen Lowman**

Many people will not have known Steve but almost everybody in the village will have heard him. The Bell Ringers of Lambourn are deeply saddened by his sudden death on Wednesday 30 November of our Ringing Master. He had a heart attack trying to fight the fire in a neighbouring garage.

Always with a smile and a stickler for high standards he made a huge contribution to ringing in our village and the area. He gave much time and energy and with endless patience teaching us how to ring and will be greatly missed by every one of us. He was also very active both in the Newbury and the Vale of the White Horse Districts. Our thoughts are with Pat his wife and his family and friends.

Brought up in Brightwell in a bakery, he learned to ring at the age of 16.He then went into the navy for 25 years serving mainly in the Far East becoming a communications specialist and met Pat his wife also a WREN on HMS President in London. They had three children Andrew, Daren and Christopher who now lives in Great Shefford.

On leaving the forces he worked in a senior role in Cable and Wireless being a commuter from Didcot to London. On retiring they moved to near Yeovil but Steve wanted to be nearer the family in this area and was very close to his children. They came to Lambourn and were very happy here.

Steve took up golf and squash quickly tiring of the former. He tentatively resumed bell ringing which he had not done since a teenager and threw himself into knocking Lambourn into shape.

The funeral on 15 December was marked by half muffled ringing by local ringers and the area. Several quarter peals have been rung in his memory. He will be sadly missed in the tower, the Sports Club and about the village.

There are three levels of award: Gold, Silver and Bronze, based on a combination of factors:


- Ringing skill and personal development

## **Bill Butler's Books**

Are you looking for a Christmas present? Have you thought of one of Bill Butler's books? He has just published two new ones, and I'll just briefly describe one of them for you. This is *Thatcham Clergy over the Centuries*, a very dull sounding title for what is really a very good read! Basically, the book deals with all the clergy since the first vicar was installed in 1317. (Confirms your opinion of it sounding dull!) However, to quote from the book: "The fortunes of any business can be directly attributed to those in charge and it's the same in the church: a strong and forceful vicar can fill the church, a weak one may empty it!

The book, based on one of the oldest continually inhabited places in England is full of colourful people and events. You will be shocked to find out how mercenary some of the leading figures in the church were all those years ago and, on the other side of the coin, how others contributed to the care and well-being of the local community! Did you know St Mary's was The Minster for western Berkshire at the time of the Domesday Book? Read how in 1450 John Pury, the owner of Chamberhouse Manor and a favourite of Henry VI, irrevocably signed over all his goods, estate and chattels to the vicar who hid the deed in the parish chest and never presented it when John died! Also about the Norfolk vicar in 1648 who arrived a couple of weeks too late to take up his appointment as vicar and found his vicarage had been stolen! Why Thatcham had to elect three churchwardens in 1446, a number kept to this day?

There are stories about the bells and ringers too. Did you know that Thatcham was the 148<sup>th</sup> tower in England to have as many as six bells in 1624? How the Kennet and Avon Canal kept the bells ringing in the early nineteenth century? That Thatcham was the fifth tower in the world to achieve more than one thousand peals.

# What are branch practices for?

I'm sure this question has been asked at numerous branch committees but it has arisen in my mind because of the surprisingly low attendance at the last two practices I've been to. In fact, the events have been quite useful for several individuals who have benefitted from ringing with a band that was perhaps stronger than is normally available to them. But there were only just enough people at these practices to make them viable and there is a danger that if a practice is held where there are just too few people, word will get around that the practices aren't worth going to, even fewer will turn up and perhaps we won't bother with branch practices.



Would this matter? I think so, for two reasons. The first is that the opportunity for people to ring in better than usual bands will be lost, and so ringing standards will not progress as they might. The second and probably more important reason is that the sense of branch community, branch cohesion, will slowly evaporate.

We are lucky to have an excellent Branch Ringing Master, and we should support her, and the whole branch community, by attending the branch practices. Put the first Friday of each month into your diaries and if you can get to the practice, do so, and help maintain a successful organisation.

# Ben's 10 for SBABC

On Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> December nine ringers from ODG Newbury Branch and W&P Guild Andover District took part in ten quarter peals as part of the 'Bellringers Strike Back Against Blood Cancer' (SBABC) campaign, for sponsorship of £30,000. All of the guarter peals were of the various methods named after Julie McDonnell, herself a ringer and blood cancer sufferer, who began the SBABC campaign.

Four of the ringers, Ben Waller, Joanne A Waller, Jonathan Waller and Tim Pink rang in all ten quarter peals; Ken Waller, Carol Waller, Joanne Waller, Mike Hurst and Mark Robins completed the line-up where required. The bands were arranged such that they were unique throughout the day.

The day began at 8.30 am at Tangley, the remote location being ideal at the time of day, where a good quarter of the Doubles variation was scored. A quarter of the Slow Course Minor was rung at St. Mary Bourne, which was also counted as the Hampshire quarter for the Julie McDonnell counties challenge which it coincided with at 10 am – the aim being to ring as many quarter peals of 'Julie McDonnell' in different counties simultaneously. Treble Place Major (the conductor's fears of this method proving to be unfounded!) and another guarter of the Doubles followed at Hurstbourne Priors and Longparish respectively.

After a quick lunch, we continued our day with Doubles again at Burghclere, followed by a rapid performance of the Minor at Woolton Hill, and two more of the Doubles at Speen and Shaw, the latter being jointly conducted by the day's full-time participants. A particularly good quarter of the Triples method was scored at Bucklebury, which left the four all-day ringers to ring a quarter of Treble Bob Minimus at Stanford Dingley, rounding off the day nicely just before 8 pm. It was at this point the fatigue became apparent, and the relief of the end of the day was palpable!

We are very grateful to Julie McDonnell for assisting us in finding sponsorship to complete our ten-in-a-day challenge. We would also like to thank the towers for use of their bells, and those that assisted by ringing the bells up ready for us. A further £155 was donated by the ten-in-a-day participants, and donated to Julie's fund to raise awareness of blood cancer. If you wish to donate yourself the website is:

# A visit to Inkpen



Does anyone know about bellringing at St Michaels Church, Inkpen? Despite being almost on our doorstep, I had no idea until recently. In fact, there is a ring of 6 hung for chiming and a full band who ring regularly for services. The way it is done at Inkpen is however, unorthodox to our way of doing things, and probably unique in terms of how the bells are actually rung. There is a rope circle but with short tail-less ropes and miniature sallies. The band do ring methods that way, following number sequences on music sheets. Ben Waller arranged for a visit on their practice night, to see how it was done and have a go. The local band made it look quite straightforward, but we did find it challenging and

managed little more than a plain course of Bob Doubles. Tricky stuff and good to see this innovative way of ringing methods on bells hung for chiming. Thank you to the Inkpen ringers for making us welcome and showing us how it is done.

# The ODG and the Oxford Guild Festival

Have you taken part in the Oxford Festival, which takes place once every five years? In the old days this was held every year on the second Saturday in July, with a lunch in the magnificent hall in Christchurch College following a service in the Cathedral. You could ring on the twelve at the Cathedral – a large ringing chamber with a fairly low ceiling! – and then wander off around Oxford ringing at all the other towers.



There are quite a lot of them, nineteen in all. You'd have a job to get them all! Some are fun to ring at; others are harder work, but I'll let you make your own decisions on that!

Some members of the Guild ask why we need a Festival: their branch provides all that they want from the Guild. That, of course, isn't really true; it only provides what you need at the present time and, what is more obvious, what you think you want at the present time.

Let's have a look at the Guild. The Oxford Diocesan Guild has the largest number of ringers in the country, ringing in 442 towers. In the 1970's it opened a Bell Fund which now has a capital sum of nearly half a million pounds which pay out substantial grants to churches in the diocese restoring their bells; there is also an additional older and much smaller Bell Restoration Fund which pays out grants.

We have a Towers and Belfries Committee which will inspect your tower if you have any odd clangs (they do a really good job!); an Education Committee who will run courses to improve your ringing; competitions to improve your striking; meetings to improve your public relations and to get to know other members of the guild.

I could go on and on. The Guild is an excellent resource that is used by those who have used it before and realise how excellent it is. Why don't you have a go yourself?

A lot has changed at St Lawrence's since Reverend Mike Saunders arrived, back in March. For example, there is a very efficient new administration in place, making things easier for booking bells for peals, weddings and

general communication. As far as our ringing performances go, we do alright on Sunday mornings, with enough to ring 6 being the norm and occasionally 8. Practices are, as always lively with methods and levels depending on who attends, which is always unpredictable, but we continue to attract visitors from other towers and I feel we get what we want out of these evenings. Quarter peals continue on a regular and frequent basis, usually for Sunday Evensong, but other times as requested/required. Last year we rang a half muffled quarter of Doubles starting immediately following the 2 minutes silence on Armistice Day. Feedback was such that I arranged the same this year, and this time, with 8 wishing to ring, aimed for Triples. Alas, the 1260 of Stedman wasn't successful, but we weren't too disappointed as the ringing was of a good standard and the feedback, just as positive as last year. We then went on to the John O Gaunt pub for lunch and free beer (compensation for tardy service!).

At Rev'd Saunders' request, and with a set of handbells in the ringing room, a group of us have started to learn how to ring tunes.
