The next Branch Dinner, to be held at the end of Quarter Peal Week, will be subsidised by £100 from Branch Funds, shared equally between paid-up members attending.

From the Chair

At the recent committee meeting of the ODG (held at St Nic's Church Hall, Newbury), the Deputy Master, Tony Crabtree, talked about attempting to survey the whole of the ODG to find out how things campanological were going on a region by region basis. He suspected wide variation, with hot spots of activity, regions of steady progress and regions of decline. Our own branch itself is a mix of these three scenes, I guess, with some good recruitment of new ringers in some areas, but difficulty keeping going in others. But I think the progress outweighs the decline, so I am reasonably confident about the foreseeable future.

Some change is inevitable. One likely change is that the job of the Ringing Master will be split among perhaps three people, one to look after the first-Friday Branch Practices, another to organise the popular Wednesday/Friday monthly mini-outing with lunch, and a third to liaise with the Andover Branch to keep the monthly Surprise Practice going. The details and official recognition of this will have to be sorted out at the branch AGM, so do come along in March to air your views.

At the last Tower Representatives meeting the issue of Data Protection was brought up. The outcome was that the effort to get positive assent from you all has proved difficult. We took the view that this was probably down to oversight, boredom with GDPR, etc., and the decision was taken to abandon that effort and to send out the newsletter and other email communication to all branch members (apart from the few who did respond to Mark's GDPR questionnaire with 'No'). In other words, the branch officers are asking you to contact Mark to opt *out* of receiving stuff from him, rather than opting *in*. This way we hope to keep branch communications alive and efficient.

Having rung Bristol S Major sporadically over a number of years, I still felt I hadn't quite got it and was all too often, the "weak link" when attempting quarters etc. So, on my request, Lucy arranged a practice evening for me. I wasn't the only "student" and I found it very useful to have 90 minutes of focussed Bristol, all place bells, touches and others sometimes going wrong near me, all helped enormously. It was a valuable consolidation exercise and one that I can recommend to anyone whatever the method/level/particular skill you need more time with. Please see the examples of what is available and make more use of your training organisation.

From the Ringing Master - Christmas 2018

As this is my last contribution to the newsletter as Ringing Master, I would like to thank everyone for their help and support. This includes: all Branch members who have attended practices; those who have organised towers – especially Marcus who, during the past year, arranged the towers for the first Friday of the month practice; members of the Committee who filled in when I wasn't around; and my long-suffering husband who accompanied me to most practices.

I started with the intention of visiting most of the towers in the Branch to gain a sense of how each was coping. Could they ring for most services? Could they get new recruits? If so, could they keep their recruits and help them achieve their potential? Although I didn't manage to get round the whole Branch, it does appear to be a varied picture in which some towers have plenty of ringers but no recruits, while other towers have recruits but struggle with the number of competent ringers on their team. Quite a number of ringers ring at more than one tower on a Sunday, which is to be applauded.

Generally, the three practices a month are well attended, with anything from ten to eighteen ringers participating. The daytime practice and pub lunch is particularly popular, regularly attracting at least fourteen and sometimes even more for lunch.

As to my successor, I do feel there is so much that can be done to encourage ringing in the Branch, and that one person cannot do it all. I have found that organising (albeit with a bit of help) three practices a month rather a struggle and feel that these could be shared out. Perhaps one way forward is to appoint a number of people with specific areas to look after. Areas of responsibility could include: organising quarter peals for different abilities; recruiting and retaining both young people and adults; looking into whether ART (Association of Ringing Teachers) and their Learning the Ropes scheme can be of use to individual towers; and organising the Branch's various striking competitions. These are just a few ideas and I am sure others will have many more to add, so please do pass on your suggestions to the Chairman or Secretary.

One final thought: how about forgoing Ringing Master as a title and appointing a number of Ringing Development Officers instead?

The future of ringing is in your hands – good luck and a very Happy Christmas to you all.



Below is a Press Release, from The Branch Chairman to the Newbury Weekly News. This was printed in the edition for the week preceding the Armistice Centenary.

Bells ring out to celebrate the end of the war 100 years ago

As the guns fell silent at 11 o'clock on November 11th 1918, bells across the land erupted spontaneously into joyful ringing in relief and celebration that The First World War was finally over. Next Sunday, one hundred years to the day after that momentous occasion, bells will, once again, ring out in a national celebration simultaneously from 12.30 PM. HM Government has requested that as many churches as possible take part as a symbol of thanks and remembrance to those who made the ultimate sacrifice in that awful conflict. The ringing community has been training new recruits for the special day and many will be ringing 'half-muffled' bells for the first time when ringing for the Services of Remembrance in their churches.

At St Nicolas parish church in the centre of Newbury we will be taking part, as will Beenham, Brightwalton, East Garston, Frilsham, Great Shefford, Hampstead Norreys, Hungerford, Stanford Dingley, Thatcham, and Yattendon.

The 'Battle's Over' campaign is also running throughout the day, and some ringing (at Bucklebury and East Garston) will be part of that programme, starting at 7 o'clock in the evening.

Martin Rice, chairman of the local bell-ringers association explains that ringing with 'open' bells produces the joyous sound normally heard, while 'half-muffled' bells produce a mournful sound appropriate for solemn occasions.

The recruitment of new ringers has been very successful locally with more than a dozen taking up the 'exercise' as we call it. It is sobering to think that seven ringers from local churches gave their lives between 1914 and 1918. One of these, John Allum, died in the last weeks of the war and was great uncle to the present tower captain at Beenham, Marcus Allum. The photo shows the plaque in the ringing room at St Nicolas commemorating the two Newbury ringers lost.





I am very grateful to all the tower members at St Nic's who come along loyally on Sunday mornings to ring. We often ring Grandsire caters now, along with good quality rounds and call changes. I am also very grateful to Julia for organising our annual tower dinner in November. We enjoyed a very good meal and good company at the Hare and Hounds.

In the tower we now have two registers – one for Sunday service ringing and another for other ringing. This has been at the request of the Church Office who like to know who comes up the tower. I am working on a high tech solution to their request to let them know how many people are in the tower at any time, just in case we need to be rescued for some reason.

Talking technical, we now regularly use Cirel in its background mode to help assess our striking. This is done with a very light touch, just in case any of you were worried about coming to a practice. It has helped raise awareness of striking issues at least, and is also helping steadily to improve the quality of our ringing. Recently, one member of our team managed to score an amazingly low error figure of just 23ms. (If you want to know what that means, and try to beat it, you will have to come along to a practice night to find out.)

Many of you will know Geoff Dodd. When he moved house to Newbury he joined the St Nic's band but has been unable to get up the stairs for many years and so has stopped ringing. He is currently in Newbury Hospital; quite 'perky' and being visited by ringers from all over the country.

ODG Ten Bell Striking Competition

Held on our home turf at Newbury this year, the test piece was 240 of Plain and Little Bob Royal, to be judged by John and Hilda Ridley from the Gloucester and Bristol Guild. In recent years, it has been a struggle to raise a band to represent the Newbury Branch, but this year, there were fourteen volunteers. So we were well placed to field a strong team with reserves, representing a wide cross section of our local towers. We attempted two quarter peals of Plain and Little in the weeks leading up to the event, but both were unsuccessful although gave some useful experience of ringing Royal on these bells. From past experience, it seems best to focus on the test piece and the placing of the band, with a practice session as close to the event as possible. To that end, we duly met at Newbury on the eve of the competition for a practice. After a number runs through, we seemed to get the hang of it and felt quietly confident that we would do ok the next day. Drawn to ring second, we got going after a crunchy start (late pull-off by someone), and settled into quite a good pace and standard of striking. However, a mistake in the last lead of the Plain Bob that lingered for most of the lead, to quote the judge John Ridley, "cost us dearly" and we accrued 46 faults in total. Having said that, we did take part and rang well for the most part giving a good account of ourselves. Here are the results:

Project 'Resound' - St Michael's Blewbury Oxfordshire

Isn't it frustrating when visiting churches around the country on ringing outings, holidays, etc. and you find no record or recognition of the bells or bellringing despite searching through church guides? Well, St Michael's Blewbury will certainly be different because we are addressing this in a bold and beautiful way!

About 18 months ago, the bellringers were approached by our Rector, Father Jason St John Nicolle, and churchwarden, Susanne Lay, asking if we would like to work with the PCC to commission a contemporary work of art to celebrate the bells and ringing in the village community, in the form of a new stained glass window. It took a very short time for the ringers to meet and say a unanimous YES PLEASE!

There has not been a new stained glass window in our church for more than 110 years, and many of the existing windows are of an unremarkable Edwardian utilitarian leaded glass. With a brief to portray the heritage of the sound of bells across the village through the centuries, a sense movement and contemporary colour and design, three artists were selected to submit their proposals. Eventually, Rachel Phillips and Linda Norris of Studio Melyn in Pembrokeshire were selected and their artist impressions of the design for the large west window in the tower are shown below.

Richly coloured and echoing movement, dynamism and scale, the eight bells are represented by a range of circular textured glass forms of different sizes symbolising the octave. These strong forms reference the idea of sound waves travelling outwards over the village, community and landcape. It is intended to internally illuminate the window so that it can be appreciated by viewers externally during the evening hours of darkness and not just during daylight.

In addition, to reflect light into the church and enhance the bold beauty of the window there will be layered, mirrored glass banners on the side walls depicting method ringing and a 'blue line' diagram of Cambridge Surprise Minor. Why a minor method you may ask when there are 8 bells? To depict a major method would require four banners on each side of the window, which would have the effect of drawing the viewer away from the window, whereas three panels draws the viewer towards the window. Prior to 1906 Blewbury had six bells and so we think that we can historically justify a 6-bell method which is often rung on our practice nights.

The project was launched to the village in June and the community are enthusiastically supporting the fundraising effort to achieve the £75,000 target. We feel that such a stunning and beautiful artistic statement will also appeal to bellringers generally, whether

or not they have local connections. We are targeting to achieve the installation of the artwork in September 2019, subject to funding. We will welcome everyone from the national and global ringing community to see this stunning and beautiful artwork and to come to ring our lovely 8 bells.
