

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From the Chair

We're in high summer as I write this piece with the school holidays almost upon us. Just a few weeks ago, we held the Branch 6 bell striking contest at Midgham. For the first time, we held the competition on the evening of the monthly practice. Four teams took part: three for the change-ringing contest and one for the Marshall Shield. The original judge had to cancel at short notice so judging was done by our Ringing Master Mike Hopkins Till. The Marshall Shield band elected to ring first but the order of the other three teams was chosen by ballot.

The team from Hampstead Norreys, who were going for the Shield, acquitted themselves extremely well. The bells at Hampstead Norreys are very different from those at Midgham. Credit must go to their captain Marcus who has taught them very well. We were very pleased to award them the Marshall Shield.

In the change-ringing competition, three strong teams had entered and the overall standard of ringing was very good. Faults ranged from slight uneveness, minor slips and wobbles. The quality of the ringing was very good so it was difficult for those listening outside to decide who would win. In the end, the results were:

1st Thatcham (24 faults)
2nd Hungerford (30 faults)
3rd Bucklebury (34 faults)

Well done, Thatcham!

Striking contests are about trying to raise standards and this shows that we do have high standards of ringing across the Branch. It was great to have the four teams taking part and I congratulate everyone and also many thanks to Di Bridle and Eava Allen for looking after us all.

To other towers across the Branch who weren't able to take part this year, I do hope that next time you will try to enter the contest as it can help advance your tower's abilities. It may seem daunting to put yourself in such a situation but if your tower hasn't entered a ringing contest recently, then you should be eligible to enter the Marshall Shield, where you ring call-changes, not method. Although there's a judge, the judgement is constructive and there to help you.

Newburys Casualty Evacuation Exercise

During Newbury tower's AGM this year there was a discussion on how we could raise our awareness of what would be involved in dealing with an unexpected medical situation occurring in the tower, in particular if someone were to collapse in the ringing chamber. I took an action to speak to the local fire brigade about how they would evacuate an immobilised casualty. This led to possibly the most exciting thing to ever happen at Newbury tower – a practice casualty evacuation with 10 or so firemen and 2 fire engines in attendance!

Arrangements were made with Newbury Fire Station for their Red Watch to come out on a weekday evening. I offered to act as the pretend casualty – the thought of being carried down the stairs by a fireman was quite appealing – but due to health & safety the brigade had to use one of their own crew as the casualty. Tower keyholders were invited to attend to raise their awareness of what an evacuation would involve.

And so the excitement began. The first fire engine arrived at the church with a crew that knew all about the practice run and a couple of whom would be taking on specific roles – one would act as a medic, and another the casualty who in this scenario had collapsed in the ringing chamber due to a suspected heart attack. A second fire engine arrived shortly after with a crew that had been told nothing other than where to be and when, and they had been given a piece of equipment that was on loan from the manufacturer and was being trialled during this evacuation – a soft type of stretcher. This second crew had to assess the situation and start by setting up the equipment needed to safely manoeuvre the casualty (strapped to the stretcher) down the stairs.

Several ropes were secured to part of the metal frame in the bell chamber and the ends attached to the stretcher, and also to the firemen who would be holding each end of the stretcher so that they would not fall (particularly important for the fireman at the foot end of the stretcher as he had to go down the staircase backwards!).

It was in this manner that the casualty strapped into the stretcher was slowly and carefully lowered down the staircase, at an almost vertical angle in order to get him around the narrow spiral of the staircase. We were impressed that they managed to get someone who was 6½ feet tall down the staircase on a stretcher without banging his head.

In the debrief at the end of the exercise the brigade crews said that the practice run had been very worthwhile as the tower presented them with some unusual challenges, and the soft stretcher had proven its value – a hard stretcher would have probably been too wide to get down the staircase. And I got to sit in one of the fire engines before they departed, which made up for not being carried down the stairs by a fireman.

NEWBURY BRANCH QUARTER PEAL WEEK 2015

What started as a fund-raising scheme for the Oxford Diocesan Guild Bell Fund back in the 1990s has become something of an annual tradition in the Newbury Branch. The Bell Fund needed to build up its funds and the Stewards of the day hatched a scheme, whereby every Leap Year the Branches in the Guild would be invited to have a sponsored quarter peal week in aid of the Bell Fund. We in the Newbury Branch joined in the endeavour and enjoyed it so much that we started to arrange a quarter peal week every year! We also maintained the fund-raising aspect and, for each quarter rung, the band contributed a donation for the Bell Fund, as well as to the host tower and (of course) the Ringing World.

This year was no exception and the week chosen was from 21st to 28th February (we do 8-day weeks in West Berkshire!). The theme this year was to enable people to ring a first of some sort, or to have some special aspect to the performance. As can be seen in the listings, we concentrated on the standard plain methods, although there were some notable exceptions (one each of Glasgow and Yorkshire S Major) and one band ventured out of the Branch to Reading for a taste of Cinques. A particularly noteworthy performance was that of 1260 Call Changes, with three first quarter-pealers. There were also quarters by a ladies band and a band of married couples.

The whole week went without too many hitches and we all enjoyed the ringing enormously. Even the unsuccessful attempts were fun – one of Stedman Doubles came to grief when a flighty rope refused to go in quick or slow, finishing with the bell down, having evaded the unfortunate ringer's hands and leaving the band chuckling at the frustrated remarks emanating from his mouth. All seemed much better after some refreshment at the establishment 100 yards down the road . . .

We were pleased to be able to ring a number of firsts in the method or on the treble or tenor. We celebrated a sixtieth birthday and re-acquainted one ringer with Grandsire Triples 30 years after his previous foray into the method! We were also delighted to be able to raise some money for the Bell Fund and hope to carry on the tradition next year.

THATCHAM

Sottanstall's BobTriples was the first QP to be rung after the last newsletter at Thatcham. This was rung by Ben and his band including six members of the Waller family and believed to be the first QP in the method. This method appears in William Sottanstall's 'Element's of Campanologia' of 1867 as 'Sottanstall's Double Place'.

Two married couples QPs have been rung; one of which was for the Golden Wedding Anniversary of Tony and Sue on the 22 June in which five couples took part ringing Yorkshire Surprise Royal. The total number of years of marriage was 177 years. Each ringer rang next to their spouse as follows:

Susan E Smith II 1, Anthony D Smith 2, Janet E John 3, Graham A C John 4, Rosamund Durham 5, John J Durham © 6, Diana M Bridle 7. Peter Bridle 8.

Tony and Sue's Wedding Anniversary was actually on the 12 June, and they went to Venice and Sorrento to celebrate. Also a QP for the marriage of Nicholas Smith and Joanna Marshall (daughter of Richard) on 2 January at Abingdon was rung at Thatcham.
